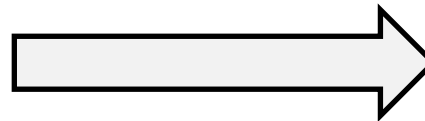

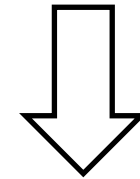

come up with a draft agenda

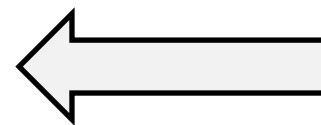


OWG's first meeting in March 2013
- representatives from 70
countries attended



OWG published final
draft in July 2014

- SDGs were formally
adopted

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

Goal	Target	Indicator
Expresses an ambitious but specific commitment	Quantified sub-components that will contribute in a major way to achievement of goal.	Precise metric from identified databases to assess if target is being met.

The forum will reveal progress, generate political impetus and launch partnerships and actions to advance shared goals.

HIGH LEVEL POLITICAL FORUM

(HLPF)

Formally established in July 2013

- Addresses new and emerging challenges
- Promotes the science-policy interface and enhances the integration of economic, social and environmental dimensions of sustainable development



HLPF WHAT WILL HAPPEN IN JULY?

HLPF in 2016 is the first since the adoption of the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs.

The session will include voluntary reviews of 22 countries on SDGs

HLPF will also include:

- a range of side events,
- a Partnership Exchange event, and
- SDGs Learning, Training and Practice sessions.



HIGH LEVEL POLITICAL FORUM (HLPF)

Frequency of meetings

Meets every year under the auspices of the Economic and Social Council, and every four years under the auspices of the General Assembly

During the meeting

The Secretary General, in consultation with Member States, will prepare a report in preparation for the 2016 HLPF meeting which outlines critical milestones towards efficient and inclusive review



CRITICISMS OF SDGs

Too broad

If everything is a priority nothing is a priority

Too idealistic

It will be very difficult to make it happen



Like MDGs, SDGs should have a focus



OPPORTUNITIES IN SDGs

However, if implemented thoughtfully with concrete plans, SDGs could present unprecedented opportunities because they:

- Seek a more integrative approach to address global challenges
- Can transform the way we are defining the international development and make it more sustainable
- Can be more transformative for the planet



WHAT'S NEXT FOR SDGs IN 2016?

The United Nations high-level political forum (HLPF) on sustainable development will meet from Monday, 11 July, to Wednesday, 20 July 2016, under the auspices of ECOSOC.

22nd session of COP22 is expected to take place in 7-18 November 2016 at Morocco

Implementation Guide for SDGs

STEP 1: Map existing national policies to evaluate alignment with SDGs

STEP 2:

Assess how SDGs can be tailored and integrated

STEP 3:

Set national targets based on an assessment of priorities and capacity

STEP 4:

Retain additional targets subject to funding

STEP 5:

Prepare implementation and monitoring frameworks
