Yogyakarta, a centre of both heritage and innovation, provides a fitting backdrop for this exchange. As Indonesia navigates its digital transformation and AI roadmap, its journey parallels developments unfolding across Europe — and ASEF is the unique platform where these two regions meet.

ABOUT THE TRAINING

Introduction

The rapid expansion of Artificial Intelligence (AI) across both public and private sectors has raised growing concerns about its implications for human rights. As AI systems increasingly influence access to services, public decision-making, and social participation, governance challenges have evolved beyond technical or ethical considerations to broader questions of accountability, power, and rights protection. While regional and international discussions have begun addressing these issues, translating shared principles into effective governance practices remains uneven across jurisdictions with differing regulatory capacities and institutional contexts. This highlights the importance of capacity-building initiatives that strengthen practical governance skills and promote shared understanding across regions.

Building on the outcomes and discussions of the ASEMHR23 Seminar on Human Rights and AI, which took place in Copenhagen in October 2025, the Asia-Europe Foundation (ASEF) and its partners, in collaboration with the Center for Digital Society (CfDS) at Universitas Gadjah Mada (UGM), is organizing a training programme in Yogyakarta, Indonesia, in March 2026. The programme aims to support early-career professionals from Asia and Europe in developing practical competencies to identify, prevent, and address human rights risks in AI deployment. By fostering cross-sectoral and cross-regional collaboration, the training seeks to translate dialogue into actionable strategies and build long-term networks that contribute to accountable, transparent, and people-centered AI governance.

Goal

To strengthen the capacity of early-career professionals from Asia and Europe to understand and address the human rights implications of Artificial Intelligence (AI), while promoting responsible, transparent, and human rights-based AI governance across sectors and regions.

Purpose and Scope

This training programme aims to translate regional dialogue from the ASEMHR23 discussions into practical knowledge and skills. It focuses on equipping participants from diverse sectors, such as government, civil society, and academia, with tools to identify, assess, and respond to human rights risks in AI development and deployment through collaborative and cross-sectoral approaches.

Expected Outcome

Participants are expected to develop a stronger understanding of the intersection between AI and human rights, formulate practical policy or governance recommendations, and establish cross-regional networks that support continued collaboration and knowledge exchange on responsible AI governance.

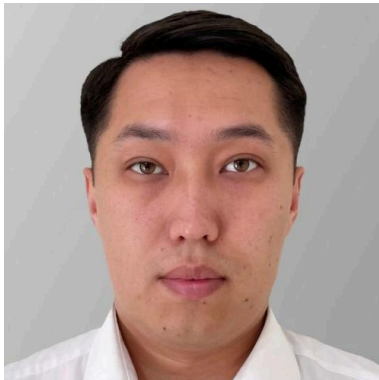

Of particular interest to her is the gap between law and practice in AI; and internet governance, and in strategies that empower affected communities to shape and enforce the rules that govern digital technologies.

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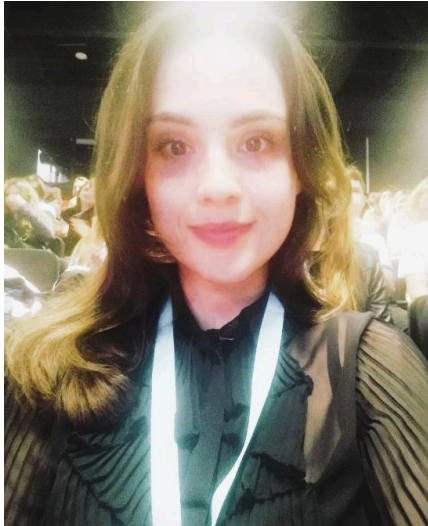
